AUDIT REPORT

February 16, 2021 To: Atonement Council

From: Atonement Audit Committee Re: 2018-2020 Financial Audits

The complexity of Atonement's financial record keeping is handled by Power Church Management computer System, tracking the assets located in 4 banks (Associated, Thrivent CU, Live Oak, & ELCA) and the transactions for the ministry plan fund 01, mission endowment fund 02, memorial fund 03, capital improvement fund 04, mission partners benevolence fund 05, and outdoor worship ministries 06.

The audit team, made up of Mike Hietpas (CPA) and Dan Christianson, with the assistance of Larry Alber and Sandy Zielinski, thoroughly reviewed the income and expenses of 2018, 2019 & 2020 The complexity of accurately recording the donations was noticed because of the 4 different paths of contributing; the normal cash/check through the plate (or mail) handled by Sandy and the counter team. Vanco Simply Giving monitored by Doug Ehrick, Breeze & PayPal gifts via e-mail through the bookkeeper's e-mail account as well as stock tradings through Atonement's TDAmeritrade account.

The Vanco Simply Giving is mostly ACH (Automated Clearing House) transfers, directly from the donor, to our Associated bank. The stock trades also come electronically to our bank. PayPal gifts come via PayPal bank – a 2.3% fee, to Associated bank with a 2-day latency. The Breeze gifts are received every Monday – a 2.9% fee with a latency of up to 10 days, making reconciling extremely difficult. Although Breeze offers the 'text to give' option, only a couple families have used it and 1 family (formerly Vanco) using the recurring option. Another is that only the Vanco system includes members envelope numbers the others do not. This indeed helps with recording a member's contribution. Almost 50% of our contributions come via Simply Giving. Vanco Simply Giving charges a small fee for those using the ACH transfer, but for those who choose the credit card option, the fee is 2.6%. There is no latency. In 2020, all Vanco electronic fees totaled \$876 while Breeze and PayPal totaled \$1600.

The check register was compared to the actual check stubs against the necessary papers needed for payment. All the necessary paperwork was in the file. The Committee relied on the controls of the payroll processing firm, Integrated Payroll Systems, and the annual budget-to-actual reviews performed by Finance Committee members and did not review payroll procedures as part of this audit.

The BIG issue is that contributions are coming from 4 different sources are stated above. All 4 have a fee for their services. This proves to be an accounting nightmare to say the least plus a rather expensive process. Last year alone it cost Atonement almost \$2500 in service fees. When trying to review the bank deposits, it was a major task to actually find where the monies came from, since we the have 4 avenues of giving. The most expensive is Breeze with a 2.9% fee with it taking up to 10 days to receive the money. Currently only 2 individuals use that service.

In summary, we found that the Atonement's Books are in excellent shape thanks to the work of Larry Alber, our bookkeeper. It is the groups feelings that one donation avenue should be removed due to the cost, lateness of payments to the church and lack of usage, that being the Breeze program.

I am grateful for our talented, committed staff members as they continue to navigate through a variety of changes, including Pastor Greg's departure. It is a joy to work with them!

MET ANNUAL REPORT MARK LEMAHIEU

Mission Exploration Team (MET) Annual Report December 14, 2021

Beginning in September, the Atonement Mission Exploration Team (MET) held its first meeting in preparation for the future pastoral call to replace Pastor Greg Van Dunk.

The MET's primary goal is to prepare the ELCA's Ministry Site Profile (MSP) document, which is created by congregations to summarize the characteristics and ministry of each church, and to serve as the first impression to share with prospective pastoral candidates. The MSP is shared with ordained rostered ministers who are interested in pastoral calls.

Prior to drafting the MSP, the MET members are spending extensive time with Atonement's membership to gather information about the upcoming call process. Nearly 20 listening sessions with congregation members, Atonement staff, WELCA circles, small groups, and youth group students and leaders have been held over the past few months.

The MET listening sessions provide the congregation with an opportunity to share their thoughts and desires about the pastoral call process. The information collected from in-person and online listening sessions is being used by MET members to draft Atonement's MSP.

In addition to the listening sessions, the congregation is regularly updated about the MET process through Atonement Bell newsletter articles, website postings, blast email messages, and worship service announcements.

In February, an Atonement congregational meeting is planned to be held with Bishop Paul Erickson and Rev. Jennifer Arnold, Assistant to the Bishop for Missional Leadership, in attendance. Jennifer provides support for Atonement's MET process.

Members of the MET include: Mark LeMahieu (chair), Cindy Dostal, Doug Ehrick, Tim Farebrother, Dave Frank, Matt Luttmann, Ron Petersen, Lori Schantz, and Rachel Zabkowicz. Pastor Lynn Erickson provides MET support.

Atonement's pastoral Call Committee is anticipated to begin its work in March.

I imagine you may have, right along with me, held hopes that this year of pandemic would bring the end of the virus with the end of the year. Our reality says we are not there yet.

While we are still dealing with COVID-19, livestreaming has remained a relevant tool for outreach.

EL SALVADOR UPDATE CINDY DOSTAL

"For I will pour water on the thirsty land, and streams on the dry ground; I will pour my Spirit upon your offspring, and my blessing on your descendants."

Isaiah 44:3 ESV

An incredible deep well, with abundant healthy water, was dug shortly before Thanksgiving, 2019. Atonement was the major sponsor for this work. Since that time, the Spanish organization, ACUA, was been working with Tepeagua to plumb water to each home and small business. The work was done in two stages; divided into north and south sides. The second or south side is currently under construction.

A Church serving a Loving God, can accomplish miracles! During the summer, over \$55,000 was raised for the Tepeagua water project. We have collaborated with several Rotary Clubs and Rotary International Foundation. Soon we will begin a project that will provide each home and business with a compostable pit latrine.

Atonement El Salvador Committee members include: Pr. Kevin, Renee Stadtler, Nancy Hanks, Katy Klinnert, Jennifer Yourd, Nichole Ostrowski, Rachelle Bartels, Angela Anderson, Marty Petersen, Dan Christianson and Cindy Dostal. Let us know if you feel drawn to service with this group. Special thanks to Renee Stadtler who serves as our representative to the Greater Milwaukee Synod El Salvador Committee. Special thanks to Nancy Hanks for continuing in management of the Days for Girl's Kits.

2021 Accomplishments *Well/Water Project:* Plumbing the water to each home is nearly complete. Atonement has raised \$55,000 and working with Rotary Clubs will be able to provide a compostable pit latrine to each home/business. Special thanks to Pr. Margarita, Dan Christianson, Jose Guillermo, Rotary International and the Tepeagua Directiva (City Council) for their leadership roles in this undertaking. Special thanks to our friend, Briseida de Menjifar, for her translation skills via Zoom. She is a vital communication link!

Goals for 2022: Sponsor a small delegation to El Salvador for a celebration of the water project. Stay tuned for dates. The trip would focus on celebration and thanksgiving and building relationships between the people of Tepeagua and Atonement.

2021 Accomplishments *Roofing Projects:* Habitat for Humanity reroofed five more homes and did a major re-roofing project on the Church, Espirtu de la Paz.

Goals for 2022: We have supported over 25 home roofs and the church roof project. This effort may go on break as we concentrate on the water project. Habitat in El Salvador has been an excellent partner.

EL SALVADOR UPDATE CINDY DOSTAL

2021 Accomplishments *Educational sponsorship:* was provided to 32 students over the year. Families annually receive: \$250 for elementary students, \$400 for middle school students, \$500 for high school students, \$750 for technical school students, and \$1200 per year for university students.

Goals for 2022: We have received requests for 10 additional sponsorships in 2022. We have lost a few of our long-time sponsors. Please consider contributing to this program. You may opt to write letters or simply provide financial support. With little travel between the U.S. and El Salvador due to the pandemic, we have only sent letters twice last year. Occasionally, I can "chat" with a student on FB messenger and have sent your letters this way. The result of this more immediate communication was immediate, spontaneous, and very heartwarming. We will work to increase this form of communication.

2021 Accomplishments *Visits:* Mission of Healing will resume February 12-19, 2022. There will be limitations due to Covid restrictions; AND it will be good to see our friends again!

Goals for 2022: We will schedule a trip when it is time for celebration of the water project. We will focus on building relationships and planning for the future of our partnership. Stay tuned!

2021 Accomplishments *Health:* El Salvador is vaccinating everyone down to age 6. They have adequate vaccine, but have encountered some resistance, particularly from some of the older population. As limited funds go to fight Covid, other health problems continue in the communities. The Gardening Program provided abundant vegetables and fruit trees to Tepeagua. Pr. Margarita is currently traveling to the community. Much of the year, her health has not allowed this to happen.

Goals for 2022: We may need to look at support to individual homes in Tepeagua as the water project completes. Some homes may need assistance to plumb an indoor sink. Some of the gardens may greatly benefit by purchases of hoses, etc.

2021 Accomplishments *Days for Girls (DFG) Kits:* The ladies of Atonement continue the incredible mission of making these reusable feminine hygiene kits. Twice, we have mailed boxes of these kits to Pr. Margarita. There is much need and gratitude!

Goals for 2022: Continue this mission. We hope several suitcases of the kits will be delivered through Mission of Healing during 2022.

2021 Accomplishments: The Church Council authorized a gift of \$1300 to remodel Espirtu de la Paz for increased security. The Church Building serves as the Community Center for the entire town and is the office for the newly elected Water Board.

APPLE TREE SOCIETY: ENDOWMENT FUND FOR MISSION OUTREACH LARRY ALBER

The 2022 stewardship campaign theme was titled "Steppin' Out in Faith." As we approach Atonement's 60-year anniversary in 2022, the committee identified three areas of focus that brought us through 2021 and are staples for Atonement's future. The three areas identified were worship variety, physical location (outdoor worship center), and children, youth and family ministry.

As of 11/25/2021 our pledge response was considerably lower than past years. The pledge cards collected for 2022 pledges totaled \$506,005. Previous years had the following pledge amounts \$541,931 (2021), \$563,694 (2020), and \$554,126 (2019). The committee has made numerous attempts to secure commitments from past pledgers that haven't yet submitted pledge cards.

We recognize that in-person church attendance was down in 2021 due to COVID still being present. Furthermore, when losing a senior pastor, it is not uncommon for a church's pledges to decline. The committee is hopeful for pledge cards to trickle in before the end of the year. Above all we know God's provision will be enough.

Giving time, talent, and love to countless projects is a vital part of our group. Unfortunately, in 2021, we were unable to meet as a large group for informative presentations, fellowship and fun. All of the scheduled general meetings were cancelled because of Covid restrictions. Our only large group meeting was a "Christmas in July" gathering. We enjoyed a light meal, followed by a white elephant gift exchange where we shared laughs together that we have missed so much.

"Women's Ministry Sunday" was celebrated on September 26th. The name change from "WELCA Sunday" recognizes all women of the church. We enjoyed a sermon from Pastor Alissa, special music and a display of LWR quilts and kits which kept so many of us busy when not together over the past year. Jeanne Coughlin was the recipient of the Trust Award. She is a blessing to all of us and to Atonement.

WELCA includes all ladies of Atonement. Circle membership is not required. Circles are actually another form of small groups that are so vital in our church life. Many WELCA outreach programs were canceled once again in 2021. However, the hard work and dedication of our group continued. Here are some highlights....

The prayer shawl ministry kept the church well supplied throughout 2021.

Mission Action: Lutheran World Relief - Many ladies worked hard during the year making quilts and assembling kits 110 quilts, 203 personal care kits, 979 school kits and 66 baby layette kits were assembled, packed and delivered to a collection site in Racine.

"Christmas in July" is an annual outreach event. This year 801 items were collected. Hats, scarves mittens, gloves, headbands and socks were collected. These items are both handmade and store bought for men, women and children.

An additional 219 quilts and winter wear were delivered to: Serenity Inn, All People's Church, the Women's Center, Hope Center, St. John's Church, The Salvation Army, Veteran's Administration Center, Divine Intervention, JS Psychological Services, Afghanistan refugees through LSS, the Muskego Food Pantry, and the New Berlin Food Pantry.

Days for Girls was able to ship 100 kits to El Salvador in November of last year and February of this year. Covid kept our Mission of Healing from happening in El Salvador in February but with these kits, the health hut in Tepeagua was able to give out kits to the girls and women in the community. In addition, in March, 50 of all the sewing components for the kits were shipped to a processing center here in the US and from there were sent to Chad in response to a dire need for refugees. Our Days for Girls group was also able to help out a local sewing group in El Salvador who is making Days for Girls kits to give out to school girls by providing some fabric and sending it the the sewing enterprise with a couple going to El Salvador.

Knits Wits: The Atonement knitters and crocheters were busy once again during a pandemic year. 143 afghans, 72 pairs mittens, 25 hats, and 8 scarves were donated to various agencies in the greater Milwaukee area. This ministry is alive and well!

Operation Christmas: This year Operation Christmas, part of our Mission Community program, tree collected items for teens ages 13-16 who are reside at the Hope House and/or attend school at the Cross Training Academy, affiliated with the Milwaukee Rescue Mission.

Fair Trade: Unfortunately, we did not sell a lot of coffee or fair trade items this year. Hopefully, the project will be able to resume in 2022.

Our mission and work will continue in 2022 within Atonement and beyond. We are a dedicated and hard working group that enjoy each other's company.

It's been my pleasure to serve as WELCA President for three years. This tenure in office wasn't my original plan, but church life as we know it may never be according to plan again. I'm thankful for the friendships I have made and for the support I've received during my term. My theme as president has been JOY. Hopefully, I brought a smile to faces and even a few laughs. It's been fun!

BUILDING & GROUNDS

2021 proved to be another busy year for Building and Grounds projects. In addition to routine maintenance and upkeep of the building, some other major projects were completed.

The six furnaces that heat the building were repaired, which in turn eliminated heating reliability issues. Repair of the fresh air damper operation in all ten furnaces has improved the air quality within the building. Installation of new thermostats will help maintain a comfortable temperature during Sunday morning services and other times the building is in use.

The parking lot drainage problem was resolved and sealing and striping were completed. Mud jacking was completed to level the patio, church entrance and east sidewalk to reduce any trip hazards.

Lemberg Electric repaired a tilted parking lot pole, and all lamps in the parking lot poles were upgraded to LED lighting resulting in energy savings and longevity of the lamps.

Because of ongoing Covid concerns and the generosity of an anonymous donor, the bathroom and kitchen soap and towel dispensers were replaced with touch less fixtures. This was a welcomed addition to the safety measures already in place at Atonement.

Wi-Fi network improvements were made to help with the live streaming of both outdoor and indoor worship services.

A crew, organized with the help of Bill Wolff, spread yards of mulch and wood chips to improve the appearance around the church building and the outside worship center.

Jon Tiedemann, from Boy Scout Troop 141, chose to upgrade the concrete approach in front of the storage garage as his Eagle Scout project. EMC Foundations and Zignego Ready Mix donated supplies to help Jon complete the job.

A significant project this year was the removal and replacement of the church organ and the installation of a new organ. I learned a lot about organs while working with the expert that came from California to complete the installation.

Thank you to the many volunteers who helped with the repair, upkeep and improvements of our church building and grounds during the year. A special thank you to Kurt Traeder, Bruce Paul, and Jerry Wollenzein for sharing their expertise. I couldn't do it without your help. Also, thank you Kara for helping me with supply orders and deliveries.

I would also like to thank the congregation for their continued and generous financial support that makes all the improvements at Atonement a reality.

Change and the need for creativity have become constants over the last year and a half in many aspects of life, including the church. This was the case for Living Christ Lutheran Church in Flagstaff, Ariz., even before a global pandemic caused many of us to rethink what it means to be church. Generosity from all three expressions of the ELCA (the churchwide organization, the Grand Canyon Synod and members of Living Christ) helped turn a congregation "on the road out of town, near the mall" into an online presence reaching over 500 people a week from Phoenix to the Philippines. (Read more about Living Christ in the current issue of "Stories of Faith in Action" at ELCA.org/SOFIA.)

Many other congregations have found new ways to connect both when inperson worship was impossible and when congregations began to return to their sanctuaries. Generosity, especially through Mission Support, helped us find and support these new ways of being connected. Early in the pandemic, ELCA Worship launched the "Worship in the Home" webpage, with Scripture, hymn links, prayers and reflections for each

Sunday. These resources were and continue to be used in congregations across the ELCA—even at **Sitka Lutheran Church** in Alaska, whose members printed and hand-delivered "Worship in the Home" resources to fellow members without internet access.

Change and creativity have taught us many things. As Pastor Sandra Rudd of Sitka Lutheran Church noted, "The pandemic was a stark illustration of the fact that the church is not a building. A lot of people say that, but we didn't fully know it until we didn't have a building to use. We learned that there are many ways to be connected as the church." Throughout the pandemic, the ELCA has changed and adapted, doing ministry in new and creative ways, because of the generosity of its members. Even now, you may be gathering in a new way for your annual meeting, to discern how you will steward the gifts shared generously with your congregation to do ministry in your community and beyond.
